In conjunction with research for this dissertation Fr Constantine was able to locate two MS editions of the Konstantinos Byzantios liturgical typika and has since begun preparation of a synoptic publication of all four Konstantinos typika sources. While recent scholarship has turned attention to the study of Byzantine liturgical typika, these writings are the first to deal with the Konstantinos typika in any systematic manner. These *Typika* are, in essence, the source for present Greek, Bulgarian and, to an extent, Romanian liturgical practice.
